All 15 players on the Metro All-Star team practiced at Kennedy Monday night and will practice again Tuesday morning. The team from Japan has compiled a 3-1-1 record on its six-game tour of lowa and the Metro players anticipate a stiff challenge.

"It's going to be a lot of fun," said Kennedy's Alex Hayden, who was named to the elite all-state team this year.

Tuesday's game is part of an exchange program between Yamanashi, Japan and Iowa. A team from Yamanashi defeated a Perfect Game all-star team at Veterans Memorial Stadium in 2010 by stealing lots of bases and playing "small ball."

Hayden, a star pitcher and second baseman, is looking forward to the challenge. "That will be cool," he said. "It's obviously different than how we play."
