"A great match," noted Kehe. "Every point was hard fought."

"Awesome," said Stecklein, whose rejuvenated squad (9-3) has now won seven in a row, including a 2-0 win over the Lions in the championship match of the Linn-Mar Invitational Saturday.

The Lions opened the night Tuesday by taking a 3-2 lead in the first game and staying ahead for a 25-21 victory.

Prairie reversed things in the next game, however, leading almost all the way in a 25-17 win.

The rubber game was a match of spurts, with Linn-Mar surging ahead 13-8 before the Hawks came back to knot the score at 20-20.

The Lions snuffed the rally with a kill shot, and Emilee McGowan served the last five points in a 25-20 go-ahead set.

The 5-foot-5 Linn-Mar sophomore (who leads her team in kills) notched two big spikes to tie the fourth game at 14-14, but the much taller front line of Prairie rose to the challenge and coasted to a 25-19 win.
