Ben Jacobson has discovered that a lot of friends are rooting for him in his fight against brain cancer, including people he doesn't even know.

The "GoFundMe" campaign to help Jacobson and his family with their medical expenses has reached \$7,620 toward the initial goal of \$10,000.

The basketball program at NIACC, one of Kirkwood's rivals in the ICCAC conference, has raised an additional \$2,000 for Jacobson through their own clinics.

Jacobson, 34, was diagnosed in October with Level 2 brain cancer. There is an inoperable 2 1/2-inch tumor in the frontal lobe of his brain, located in a delicate spot that cannot be removed by surgery.
